The Humble Petition of John Eames & his Brethren.

Sheweth

That whereas on the 2^{cond} of ffebruary next after the Narragansett Fight, Five of the Natick Indians revolting from the English afsaulted Thomas Eames his house and deftroyed it, and flew his wife and five Children (and Foure only of those whome they tooke into Captivity returned) And whereas two of those Murders, Old Jacob a cheife man fometimes att Natick and Jofhua Afsuns returning within the time Limited by Proclamation had their Lives granted then and they lived many Years att Natick after their Return. And whereas the faid Thomas Eames Sued to the Indians of Natick for fome Recompence for the Irreparable Injury don him and his ffamily & Obtained a parcel of Land of two or three hundred Acres not Farr from the place of the fd Thomas Eames his former habitation, Which ye Indians of the Towne of Natick gave him Poffeffion off, & faid Land was built upon and Inhabited by faid Thomas Eames and his fons before his deceased. And Whereas for the more legall confirmacoñ thereof to him his heirs and afsigns he obtained on January 24th: 76: An Act of Natick Indians att their Court at Nonantum for the fame Only it was ordered that Sherbourn men fhould make the Indians fome Consideracoñ out of their Lands that they were to Exchange with the Indians by Allowance of the Generall Court of the Colony; Alfo the Towne of Sherbourne to Gratifie the faid Eames did Grant him Two hundred Acres of Land as by their Towne Records Appears to deliver to the Indians for Recompense for that land of theirs that he faid was faid Thomas Eames his Land Included in the Exchange of Land that they of Sherbourne made with the Indians of Natick. Whereupon the Indians being fomewhat difsatisfied, John Eames Your humble Petition^r was constrained to Pay Twenty and two pounds in money to the Indians of the Town of Natick besides all the Coft his Father and himfelf were att in the Relieving one of their olde Indians that was the Sachem of that Land; and obtained a Deed from foure of their principall men att Natick Comittees of the Town of Natick in the names of the faid Towne fully granting enfeoffing & confirming the faid Lands that faid Thomas Eames was polselsed off in his life time unto his heires and afsignes of the faid Thomas Eames our Father, In which deed moft of what wee have above expressed is brought in as the Speciall consideracoñs on account wherof they confirme said Lands to our Father and sons the faid heires and others the afsignes of the f^d Thomas Eames, and faid Deed was acknowledged and recorded in the Yeare 1695. And Whereas wee the heires of the faid Thomas Eames are like to be Ruined a fecond Time by being Ejected out of fd Lands for want of Leave from ye Generall Court to have seen granted to The Indians to fell this Land to us (That Liberty that was Granted them by the Generall Court may 28th - 1679 att the Motion of Thomas Eames being Eluded by the unwilling nefs of Sherbourne People to grant the Indians any of their Land in Exchange for these our Lands and foe to take o^r Lands into their Township)

Yo^r Petitioners Therefore doe humbly and Earnestly Pray the mercy Compassion and favour of this high and hon^{ble} Court That our Lands foe fold us by the Indians may be allowed and Confirmed to us by Yourfelves, and that wee and ours may not be in perpetuall feare and danger of Utter Ruin whicvh if you shall not have com

pa $\sqrt{\text{sion Upon us, will hang over our heads.}}$
