The Petition of us the Subscribers poor Distressed Indians Proprietors of Marshpee in the County of Barnstable Humbly Shew. that some time in the last Sefsion of the General Court your Petitioners presented a Petition to your Honours repres= =enting our troubles in part, which Petition we are informed was read and Committed to a Committee and for want of time to transact the more Important Business then before your Honours was refered to your next Session, we your Petitioners thank your Honours for your kindness and great care in making a Law in June last for the Regulation of Marshpee which is well adapted for us under our cur= =cumftances and are well satisfied with the same, as also highly pleased with the Gentlemen appointed for our Guardians expecting they would accept the Trust and call our old Masters the former overseers to a Just Settlement who has Improved our Lands and let others Improve them for more then Twelve years last past with =out rendering to us an Account of the Monies recd by them, neither have they relieved our wants when in great Distrefs your Honors well know that poor Indians in time past obtained their Liveing most= =ly by Hunting, Fishing and Fowling, which of late is out of our power to get a Liveing by, our Lands being now almoste the only income we have to Support ourselves, In our Petition now before your Honors we Prayed that the Gentlemen last appointed our Guardians might be continued in their appointment since which we find The Rev'd M. Hawley and Reuben Fish decline accepting and Executing their trust as Guardians agreeable to the said Law, Your Petitioners further Pray that Doc. Samuel Savage and both of Barnstable being perfons of good Character may be appointed Guardians in the Room of said Hawley and Fish and that our Guardians may be inabled by a Resolve of the General Court to Settle our Account with our former overseers, Your Petitioners beg leave further to Represent that Previous to the late War the Society in England maintained our Missionary and by their Annual Donations in some measure relieved our Poor but as we are not to expect in future any Assistance of this kind our Lands is the only resourse, and unless the Improvement of it is put under a better Regulation then it has Stood upon before the late Act took place we apprehend we shall be very little the better for it &c as in Duty bound shall ever Pray
