

A Discovery In Writting of such agreements . as ware. by ye Magistrats . with ye Indians of Tunckfes . Sepus. Concerning the Lands and such things for Referrence thereunto as tend to Settle peace. In A way of truth . & Riteousnefs Betwixt . ye English & them In primis . taken for Granted that the Magistrats . Bought ye whole Cuntry . to the . moohaks Country . of Sequafon ye Chieff Sachem. – Item that Notwithftand- ing theyer Intreft by that means . yett the . Magistrats . Did In A friendly maner . Come to Terms with ye Tunckses Indians, that fum English might come . & Live amongft them, which Terms were thefe. that ye Indians should yeild up all the Ground that they had . under Improvement . Att that time – when the Bargain was firft made. and Receive Ground In place together Compafed about with A Creke . & trees ., and Now allfo to be ftakt out, onely – In that piece ye English were to have ye ufe . of ye Grafs for theyer Cows . which Now to Avoid Contention . the English are Willing to Lett goe all fave one Little flip which is allfo to be ftaked out to prevent Contention: -- Itim . that what Ground . they Deliver up to ye English, In other places that was In ye firft Bargain making, under ye Improvement of ye Indians, A like proportion (if ye place will bare it, shall be Broke up for them, and ye Indians to hold that they have In present pofsefsion . till . that be broke up In that place, -- Itim. that this being Done . the Indians have no propri- =aty In any other Ground . any where Elfe within ye Bounds of this Plantation, & yett they Shall have . Liberty to fell wood for . fewel . or . other necessary ufes . so they Do it not In mens . home Lotts . or to ye Spoyling of Grafs . or Corn of ye English, nor fhall they be hindered of fifhing, fouling & hunting, Soe it be not Dun to ye Breach . of any orders In ye Country to . hurt Cattle . &c . fifhing, fouling & hunting being Left Equally free . to English & Indians ----- Itim. that it is Clear that all ye Lands ye English have . is Little worth till . ye Wisdom Labour and Eftates of ye English be Improved upon it.—And ye Magaftrits when they have Lands In A Place Give it away to English men to Labour upon, and take nothing for it ---- Itim that ye peace & plenty. that they have had, and Enjoyed by ye presence of ye English . In Regard of protection . of them, & trade with them . makes more to ye advantage & Comfort of ye Indians tho they hire fume Land then ever they Enjoy'd Before the Comeing of ye English, when all ye Land was In theyer own difpofe: and altho they Do hire In Regard of ye Inceaf of theyer Com- =pany: yett Now Corn & Skins will Give a Good Price . which will Counter- =vail much more . then ye hire of theyer Land.—and therefore ye Indians have Reason to Live loveingly among ye English by whom theyer Lives are pre- =served . and theyer . Eftates & Comforts . advantaged.—and this we ye Chieffe Indians .
