

To the honoured Court now held in Hartford Greeting 73  
These are to putt you in minde of the former unity which  
was betwixt you and our Nation when you were distresed  
by our enemies in the Nanaganfett wars Momoho was then  
the Pecot Saysum and had Sixty men under him and att  
all your expeditions of War was ready to serve you & doubtles  
was a guard to your nation which for to requite us the Hon=  
=oured Gentlemen of this Colony gave to us five Hundred Acree<sup>s</sup>  
of Land which for that Gratis wee humbly thank you but itt  
Lying remove from the Sea wee suppose itt would be very  
difficult for us to gett a Lively hood upon itt where upon wee  
made an exchange with m<sup>r</sup> Isaac Wheeler for two hundred  
& eighty Acrees near the Salt water only m<sup>r</sup> Wheeler reserved  
the stalks of our fields for his Cattle & horses which was to  
our damages as itt now proves the Sd Wheeler now being dead  
his Sons Claime whole priviledge of the Herbage and tell us that  
when one or two more of us be dead the Lands will fall to them  
again which some of us are ready to believe itt will be soe  
and now Enflgn Samuel Miner & Josias Grant hath bought  
Country Grants and pitched them upon our Lands and tells  
some of us that wee would Lett them fence & improve with  
us; that they will vindicate our Cause betwixt the sd Wheeler  
and us which wee would desire the Honoured Court to vindi=  
=cate our caufe in that matter & give us further a<sup>s</sup>suranc<sup>e</sup>  
of our Lands & alsoe to sequestor itt to us and our posterity  
we suppose that there will be some pleas make that wee  
are almost all dead & indeed so we be but yett wee have  
Thirty three men yett alive which belong to Momoho bes  
besides woemen & Childreen therefore we would begg the  
Honoured Courtt that they would take that prudent care  
of us as to Lett no Country Grants to be Laid upon our  
Lands and alfoe wee desire the Honoured Court that they  
would impower some of our Neighbours to have some  
inspection over our Lands that we may nott be wronged  
but wee and ours posterity may enjoy them peaceably  
These from the sunks squaw which was the wife of Momoho  
and her men.
