The Memorial of Samuel Moho & others in behalf of them selves theire Bretheren & Sisters Indian planters belonging to the Town of Stoughton in the County of Suffolk -**Humbly Sheweth** 

That we look upon you as our Fathers & we really believe you love to be kind to us, but we believe you have not known how we have been abased for many years past. Therefore we pray Your Excellency & Honours will not be angry with us for Complaining /. and we would say that we verily believe that Col: Miller and Major Shepard have in their Accounts charged many things wrong fully.

And we are Sure that Since they were Set over us our woodlands have been plundered by many perfons So that our Cedar Swamps & Timber Trees have been destroy and our firewood cut off of our Land to that degree that our lands are now Thousands of pounds of lefs value than they were ten years ago ~ And we have had no recompence for the Same we doubt not but you our Fathers are disposed to Shew us more kindness than you would show t[ hole ] the Eastward Indians.

[ hole ] are very much difsatisfied with the managem of Col: Miller & Major Shepard and without your Excellency & Honours will appoint some Gen:tn to look into the Matters we complain of we shall in a Short Time come to beggary Major Shepard has mightily caused three of

to be put into prifon and there kept a great while in the most diftrefsed Condition for we could not beg or If we did we could not get any thing by it as the white people could, & he rather sides against us than for us in Any disputes. There are many of our kind neighbours see that we are wronged & have told us that we migh [ tear ] Complain to the Governour & the Great Court which we now do & humbly pray we may

be heard upon those points wherein we have been grieved & Injured, and that your Excellency & honours would In your great wisdom goodness & kindness relieve us, and we Shall be very thankfull to your Excellency & Honours
