School at Stonington, which I  
(Joseph Filh,) have taken y<sup>e</sup> whole  
Care of, ever Since the Year 1757.  
in y<sup>e</sup> Spring or Summer, As Ap  
pears from my First Minute  
Book of Ind<sup>n</sup> Affairs at Stoning.<sup>t</sup>  
of which, I now find, a Journal  
would have been especially Ser  
-viceable. –

My Service for these Indians,  
in the Affair of their School, &  
the Blankets, Sent by the Com<sup>is</sup>.<sup>rs</sup>  
to be distributed by Me, (Exclu  
sive of the Monthly Lecture And  
all things relating to that,) From  
Decemb<sup>r</sup> 1771, is as follows

Dec<sup>r</sup> 16. Spent the whole day at Ind<sup>n</sup>  
Town on y<sup>e</sup> Affair of School house  
& Blankets.

The Indians generally met me at  
Blind Jacobs, and first tryd to Settle  
[ *torn* ]airs with Mary Ned, about keep-

2/ keeping School Still longer in her  
house.—On Nov<sup>r</sup> 30. 1767 I paid  
her husband Edw<sup>d</sup> Nedfon 40/. Sent  
by the Commis<sup>rs</sup>, to fit up one of  
his Rooms, for y<sup>e</sup> Ufe of the School,  
which was at his own motion, &  
to his Acceptance, And, (as I took  
it )<sup>He</sup> intended the Room for that Ufe,  
for y<sup>e</sup> future, Sine Die.—

Year Months  
Ned kept school, in s<sup>d</sup> Room, 1<sup>r</sup> 9. &  
then Died. – Jn<sup>o</sup> Shattock 4 months,  
& Jacob Fowler 3 m<sup>o</sup>, in y<sup>e</sup> Whole  
2 Years & 4 months. –

Then Mary Ned turned us out, &  
Said we should ufe her house, for y<sup>e</sup>  
School, no longer.

I as Agent for the Commis<sup>rs</sup> a-  
greed with her, to leave it to Esq<sup>r</sup>  
Charles Phelps & M<sup>r</sup> Abijah Hewit,  
And calld them out This day. But  
Niether of them w<sup>d</sup> Undertake it.—  
So I endeavoured, with y<sup>e</sup> help of In  
dians present to convince her that

the Ought, both in point of Justice  
to the Commis<sup>rs</sup>, & from Regard  
to y.<sup>e</sup> Good of y.<sup>e</sup> Ind<sup>ns</sup> & their Ch[ *torn* ]

longer, not fixing Any time.

But she was deaf as An Adder  
to All Argum<sup>ts</sup> & Intreaties.

She Obstinately withstood us And  
Absolutely refused to let the Indians  
have anything more to do with  
her houfe, in reference to keeping  
School in it. — So <sup>I</sup> gave y.<sup>e</sup> matter  
up, -- And concluded to try for  
a New Shool houfe. For the Buil  
ding of w<sup>h</sup> The Ind<sup>ns</sup> Seemd Spiritted.  
I told them I would Interced w<sup>th</sup>  
Cap<sup>t</sup>. Cyrus Wheeler to give Tim  
ber for the Building.

Abner, Jno Quiumps & Jonath<sup>n</sup>  
Nooky, promised to do their Part.

Mary Ned promised to so Some  
thing confiderable tow<sup>ds</sup> it.

Patience (her Mother,) promised  
she w<sup>d</sup> give Ten shillings. &c

I then proceeded to the Dis-  
tribution of the Blankets, hav-  
ing reserved Ten for This Town  
[ *torn* ] Neighb<sup>h</sup>ood — To do w<sup>h</sup> right

The discourfed with the Indians  
about the Circumstances of Each  
one, that I might use my belt  
Discretion in the Distributions  
w<sup>h</sup> was my Gen<sup>l</sup> order from  
the Commis<sup>rs</sup>, and to have a  
Special Eye to The Aged, Sick  
& Infirm.—

After I had obtaind y.<sup>e</sup> belt [ *crossout* ]  
light I could get, I orderd & Gave  
Blankets to the following p<sup>sons</sup>

W<sup>m</sup> W<sup>ms</sup> where the Blankets were lodgd, And dealt out y.<sup>e</sup> 9 Nine blank.<sup>ts</sup> to y.<sup>e</sup> perfons Above, or their Order, And Sent by old Sarah Jacob one Bla-anket allotted to Esther Tugwifs, to be delivered or Sent to her: & alfo Sent, by s<sup>d</sup>. Sarah, The one remaining Blket [ *torn* ] be lodged at her houfe till I [ *illegible* ] [ *torn* ] of it, being Undetermined, as yet,

at Ind<sup>n</sup> Town – Met with Cap<sup>t</sup>  
Cyrus Wheeler at blind Jacobs—  
He told the Indians y<sup>e</sup> Same as he  
told me, when I went to his house,  
to ask the Favour of Timber &c  
~~for~~ to build a School Houfe for y<sup>e</sup>  
Ind<sup>ns</sup>, viz: That he would give  
them Timber, off his Land, adjoin-  
-ing Ind<sup>n</sup> Land, for the Frame of  
y<sup>e</sup> School houfe & Logs &c: of old  
Stuff, already down, enough to Co-  
ver, y<sup>e</sup> houfe, viz. Board shingle,  
Clapboards &c: We talkd of 20

to go immediatly about y<sup>e</sup> work [ *torn* ]

he should speak with me before he  
proceeded any further in his school.

I told him what Complaints were laid  
in Against him; And he ingenuously  
owned the Subftance of them, viz: that  
he had of late been Sevll times o-  
vertaken with Strong drink, & had neg

I could not, confistent with my Truft

Employ any man in y<sup>e</sup> School, that  
was not of <sup>^</sup>a Sober Life & Converfation,  
And y.<sup>t</sup> did not follow his Buifnefs with

Employ him any longer, at prefent  
not till he had given some proof of  
a real Reformation. And upon it  
alk'd him, what I ~~sh<sup>d</sup>~~ or we sh.<sup>d</sup> do?

He replyd, what I pleafd –  
I alk'd him, if he had a mind to keep  
the school any longer; & in order to  
it would labour for a Reformation?

He Replyd, he did not know—he  
did not Care much about it. – I  
checked him for making of it a mat-  
ter of so much lightnefs & Indifference.  
And having solemnly warned him,  
And in y<sup>e</sup> moft gentle & tender manner

12/ to Speedy Repentance, by look-  
ing to God for his Grace to help  
him, I then Difsmifsd him  
from Our Service in y<sup>e</sup> ~~Schoo~~ In-  
dian School here, ~~till~~ at leaft,

I alfo settled Acc.<sup>ts</sup> with him, &  
found, by his Acc.<sup>t</sup>, that  
He began this laft Quarter on y.<sup>e</sup>  
7<sup>th</sup> of Aug.<sup>t</sup>—That,  
He kept in y.<sup>e</sup> School till y.<sup>e</sup> 23d  
of Octob<sup>r</sup>, & then left keeping.  
That he had loft 15 ½ Days, in  
that time, which, being made up,  
leaves him 2 months wanting  
½ a Day good, in y.<sup>e</sup> laft Quarter  
Even from y.<sup>e</sup> s<sup>d</sup> 7<sup>th</sup> of Aug.<sup>t</sup> to  
~~the~~ Thursday y.<sup>e</sup> 7<sup>th</sup> October w<sup>h</sup>  
I must <sup>^</sup>pay him, alfoon as I got it  
of the Commifioners, or elfe  
draw order on Govr Oliver for it.

And as Sarah, Richards wife, has been at a great deal of Trouble & Charge in Boarding y<sup>e</sup> master, & moving out of her Houfe, for 3 or 4 Months, that y<sup>e</sup> School might be kept there, when none else w<sup>d</sup> give leave, I thot it right that she shoud have y<sup>e</sup> Use of sd Blanket, till it should be needed Again for a Master: So left it in her Care ‘till I should Call for it.

And then Ordered one New Blanket, which Sarah Dick had y<sup>e</sup> 7<sup>th</sup> Sept<sup>r</sup> laft, for Schoolmaster Lodging when needed in Cold weather, (Orderd This I say) in old Sarah Jacobs room, & not to be ufd, till I calld for, for y<sup>e</sup> use of a Master. So that I have Two Blankets in Relieve for School masters lodging.—

took his Rec.<sup>t</sup> in Full, for the Firft  
Quarter, which ended April 14.<sup>th</sup> at  
night, he having gaind 6 days

in 12 weeks, by keeping every Saturday after noon; which paid 2 Days, loft Time, & gaind 4.—

Fryday Morning, April 15. 1774 William Pendleton began to keep ~~school~~ school, his Second Quarter, at our Ind<sup>n</sup> Town. Amboofamous, Stonin.<sup>t</sup> @£5.10.—p Quarter.—

When he confented to keep 2 Quarters out before he called for next payment.
