in Goal, and released by paying Costs, and must
suffer the same again unless the said note
is immediately paid, and having no other
means to raise the money, she prays the
Guardian of the Natick Indians, may be
authorized to Sell the said land for the
most the same will fetch, and take up, said
Note, paying the overplus over to your
Petitioner, should there be any
